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# Simple Sentence

Simple sentence consists of a subject (S) and a verb (V).

There are many types of simple sentence patterns. Below are the **FOUR** most common patterns.

Pattern	Example
Subject – Verb (S – V)	The <u>children</u> <u>laughed.</u> S V
Subject – Verb - Object (S – V - O)	My <u>father bought</u> a <u>car.</u> S V O
Subject – Verb - Complement (S – V - C) (The complement comes after verb to be)	The <u>people</u> <u>were</u> <u>happy at the party</u> .  S V C
Subject – Verb- Expansion (S – V - E) (The Expansion usually gives information on when, what, how, for how long)	The <u>boy fell from the ladder yesterday.</u> S V E

# Compound Sentence

Compound sentence is a combination of two or more simple sentences.

#### It is formed by:

- a) using coordinating conjunctions (and, but, nor, so, yet, etc)
- b) using adverbial conjunction/conjunctive adverb (meanwhile, however, therefore etc)
- c) using semicolon (;)

#### Example:

The students can borrow the books from the library. (Idea 1)

Linking the 2 ideas

They can also buy the books. (Idea 2)

The students can borrow the books from the library or they can buy them.



# More Examples:

- My children were sleeping, so I baked a chocolate cake.
- I like chocolate ice cream, but my friend likes strawberry.
- Amy is baking a cake; meanwhile, her sister is decorating the cookies.



### **COMPLEX SENTENCES**

Complex sentence includes at least one independent clause and one dependent clause.

An **independent clause** is a sentence that contains a subject and verb and can stand alone. It expresses a complete thought.

A **dependent clause** cannot be a complete sentence. It is often signaled by a dependent marker word.

Eg: after, although, as, as if, as long as, as though, because, before, even if, even though, if, if only, in order that,

#### Example:

There are so many people at the Financial Management conference who are waiting for Prof Jay's speech on managing money.

**Independent clause:** There are so many people at the Financial Management conference

**Dependent clause:** who are waiting for Prof Jay's speech on managing money.



# More examples

- Ramli exercises for twenty minutes everyday, before he goes to work.
- While the patient was eating breakfast, he began to feel sick.
- Although I practiced driving for two months, I failed the driving test.

# Compound-Complex Sentence

Compound-complex sentence consists of **TWO** independent clauses that joined by conjunction, and a dependent clause. We can say that compound-complex is made up of a compound sentence and a dependent clause.

### Example:

**Independent clause:** I would have bought the cake

**Dependent clause :**that you really like

**Independent clause:** it was sold out

I would have bought the cake, but it was sold out.



# Summary

#### **SIMPLE SENTENCE**

- consists of a subject (S) and a verb (V).

Eg: The cat sat on the mat.

#### **COMPLEX SENTENCE**

- consists of at least one independent clause and one subordinate clause

Eg: If you are interested in becoming an engineer, you must get used in applying formula and solving problems.

#### **COMPOUND SENTENCE**

- a combination of two or more simple sentences.

It is formed by using conjunction, conjunctive adverb or a semicolon (;).

Eg: I like chocolate ice cream, but my friend likes strawberry.

#### **COMPOUND-COMPLEX SENTENCE**

- consists of at least one compound sentence and one complex sentence.

Eg: I would have bought the cake, but it was sold out.
