What is Storyboard

- A storyboard is a sketch of how to organize a story and a list of its contents.
- A series of visualizations that show the key points of view in a progressive manner.

Why do we need storyboard?

- Helps Developers plan and manage the development process.
- Enables Developers to test the concept in a visual representation of the whole project
- Facilitate visual communication between developer-users
- Proceed to develop at the same time

How do I make a storyboard?

- Storyboards are drawn in pen or pencil. If you don't like to draw you can also take photos, cut out pictures from magazines, or use a computer to make your storyboards.
- Keep in mind that your drawings don't have to be fancy! In fact, you want to spend just a few minutes drawing each frame.
- Use basic shapes, stick figures, and simple backgrounds.
- If you draw your storyboard frames on index cards, you can rearrange them to move parts of the story around.

How do I make a storyboard?

 A storyboard does not have to feature accomplished art, It can be drawn with "stick figures" as long as the director's vision of the final edited scene is clearly communicated.



Benefits of storyboarding


- Storyboarding is important even for low-budget production.

There are 2 types of storyboard:

- 1. Presentation Boards
- 2. Production Boards

Presentation Boards

- Used to communicate an idea or concept to clients, producers, a director or studio execs.
- These boards are "more polished" than production boards and are meant to impress and persuade; to sell the concept.
- Use digital photos of actual locations and layer characters, props and other elements over the background.



Production Boards

- Visually scripting a story and creating a shot guide for the crew to use on the set.
- They're called "production boards" because images are rough sketches that communicate the setups and main elements of each scene.
- This type of board can be made by the director and shared with the crew.
- Production boards cut down the setup time for each shot and preempts questions from crew members.
- Captions can hold slug lines and dialogue text; camera and lighting notes; or prop and scenery notes.




